The birth of barter

Victorian Workhouses provided work and shelter for poverty-stricken people who

had no means to support themselves. The Poor Law helped Victorian workhouses become prison systems for the most vulnerable members of society.

Scrip was a privately issued currency that had its origins in the truck system, usually

in the form of metal tokens, redeemable only at the company store. The scrip system

was common in American coal towns in the early 20th century, and miners could 'draw scrip' from the company, essentially receiving credit against future wages. **1949** USA
